ADMISSIONS "INTERVIEWS" IN THE DIGITAL WORLD

For years, many of America's top colleges conducted interviews of applicants as part of the admissions process. Having served in this capacity for Harvard for over 29 years, I cannot tell you how many times I sat down with bright young people at a Starbucks for an hour-long chat that turned into an Interview Report, which proved to be highly influential in determining who got in and who did not.

Then Covid-19 hit and put a stop to most everything.

Yet now that the world is transforming into another "new normal." Things change, but things also remain the same: the admissions interview is BACK.

Well, not necessarily an "interview" in the classic sense

Some schools have returned to performing interviews, usually by alumni, only now many of those interviews are being conducted over zoom or some other form of digital video chat. However, new formats – which were becoming more popular even before the pandemic – are being utilized by many schools. One or two-minute prerecorded videos often take the place of live interviews. Even in an Instagram world, these are hard for anyone to master.

First, with a prerecorded video, there is nobody with whom to interact. That may seem like a benefit to some, but for most people, the inability to have meaningful conversations can change the human dynamic for the worse. It is very hard to demonstrate that you will be a beneficial part of a campus community in a format with zero give-and-take.

Second, these videos are short. Whereas an interview provides time and opportunity to communicate memorable stuff, a prerecorded video just ... doesn't.

So, how do you create a video that helps you become part of a school's next class?

Let's start with discussing what not to do. Don't try to be perfect. Psychologically, although humans are impressed by perfection, we tend to like imperfection. In art, we usually prefer asymmetry over symmetry; off-center is more interesting. When you mirror an attractive face through Photoshop, the model or movie star somehow doesn't look as attractive. My funniest stories are about what went wrong, not about what I did right.

Translating this into the world of admissions, please do not create an overworked, overproduced movie. Admissions officers are looking for genuine people, not immaculate editing. This is not a portfolio for a competitive film major. This is a quick meet-and-greet.

Perhaps the most important advice is: relax. Just be you. Don't worry so much about making mistakes (bloopers, by the way, can be endearing). In fact, the chance that you'll get a great video in just one take is practically zero. Assume that you're going to make many attempts before achieving even a palatable result. Remove the pressure from yourself.

But what to say, or do? Please, do not recite your resume, achievements or qualifications. They already know about those things from your application. The video is meant to add information – about your human side – not "prove" yourself.

Definitely give your name, where you're from, and ... then what? Here lies the brilliance of a short take. You can say and do pretty much anything you want (within the boundaries of decency, of course). If you look at YouTube, you will see dozens and dozens of short admissions videos, but remember: they are usually posted by students (as something the kids enjoyed), not by admissions offices (as something that proved effective). Use the internet, but only for giving yourself comfort that anything goes.

Discuss what you are looking forward to doing in college. Chat about how your friends make you laugh. Describe a quirk or idiosyncrasy. Tell them about a question which vexes you. If you're unsure about what to say, try a bunch of different ideas, then ask your friends or parents what they like. Remember: it's all about what the audience wants.

Ultimately, admissions officers just want to get to know you, not some perfect presentation. As one admissions dean told me: "Trying to be someone you're not because you think that's what I want? It's not good. I'm going to be intrigued by an interesting person who probably is not perfect. In fact, I'd be very skeptical of the perfect 17 or 18-year old. I've never met that person."

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CORONAVIRUS PANDEMIC XV – FINAL POST COVID – LESSONS LEARNED

Although new cases are in decline, the pandemic has driven the patients and their healthcare providers to adopt new ways to manage illnesses. Needless to say, this has been perhaps the most difficult time in the annals of patient management. And going forward, many of these changes in our health care delivery system as discussed below, are here to stay. Welcome to the new normal!

1. Telemedicine: The virtual or zoom visits for medical follow-up care took off during the peak days of Covid-19 and has all but replaced the traditional office visit. Now, the patients have learned to log

into their computer or smartphone and discuss current issues with their physicians. And they seem to like it since they can do it conveniently sitting at home. Arrangements for in-person visit can be made as and when necessary.

2. Emergency visits to the hospital and urgent care centers have come down. Unless the situation warrants immediate attention, patients prefer zoom communication with their doctors. One drawback is that occasionally serious problems like impending heart attacks may not get prompt attention, leading to complications. Also, remember that ERs and urgent care centers are already busy these days with a significant delay in seeing patients.

3. The pandemic is likely to continue for some more time and then will remain with us as an endemic popping up during winter time like the flu; so, be ready for annual vaccination. Hope most of you got your booster shots.

4. Symptoms of anxiety and depression among U.S. adults have been amplified ever since Covid-19 started. Initially, it was the 'confinement anxiety' from lockdown but even after the rules were relaxed, there is still considerable restrictions to our mobility. Women seem to be more severely affected by the social and economic consequences of the pandemic. So, it's important to take steps for proper handling of these mental health issues.

5. Sadly, there has been reports of increased domestic violence after the pandemic began. When you have to stay put in with less chance for social outing, there's likely to be too much closeness that creates a fertile ground for abuse, although it should never be that way. So,

beware of the problem and take appropriate remedial action.

6. Children also suffered as frequent school closures kept them away from friends and in-person learning. Although many schools are open now, we don't know what will happen if and when another surge of the pandemic occurs. However, certain items such as psychological counselling sessions, private tutoring lessons, etc., are still being conducted through zoom. Children are also becoming addicted to iPads and cell phones and weaning away these gadgets from them needs deft handling.

7. 'Working from home' has become the order of the day and 'going to the office' as we know now may become a thing of the past. Many companies are now remote-only operations in which employees never collaborate in person. This may lead to loss of a sense of shared empathy, coordination and comradery.

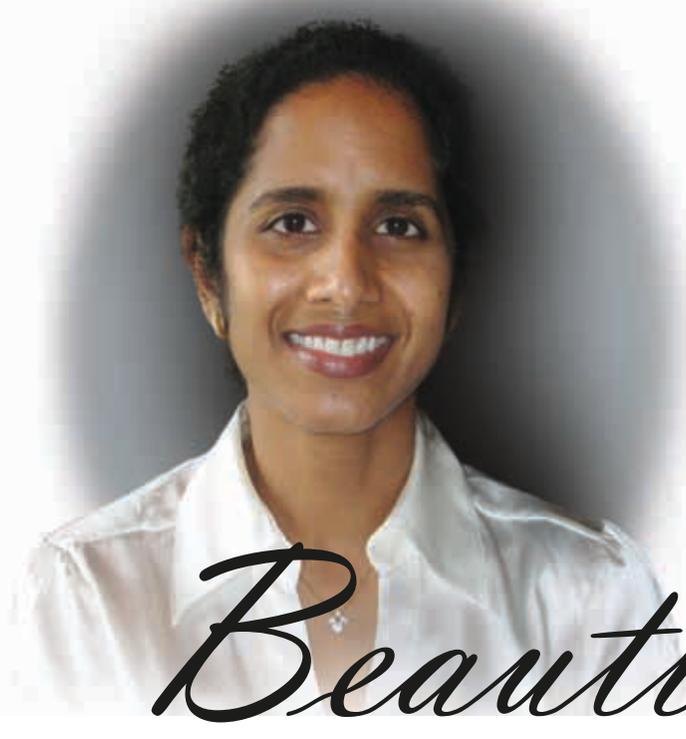
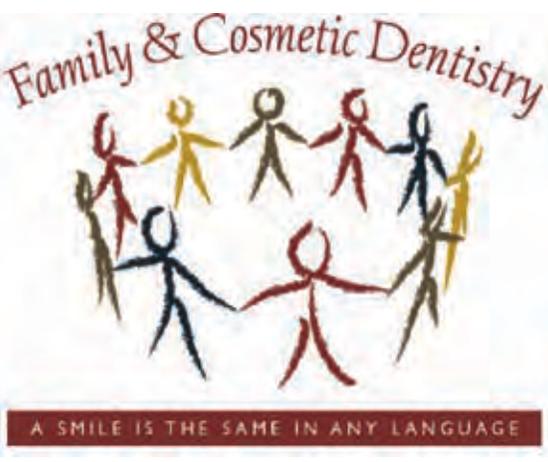
8. "Pandemic posture" is a new problem to contend with. The poor stance from constant slouching at a desk or on a couch that many of us have been resorting to these days can result in back or neck pain. To reduce the pain, exercise daily. Working with a physical therapist to learn the right way to sit up straight and how to strengthen the muscles that support the posture, sitting on a chair with cushioning for the buttocks and support for the lower back, getting a footrest, keeping your computer monitor at eye level and using an ergonomically designed mouse and wrist pad – can be helpful. Also, get up, stretch and walk around for just five minutes every hour.

9. Withering of social life: A lot of relationships have suffered largely because of the inability to get out of the house and move around freely. And many social gathering places have closed down as well that has depleted the joys that make up a human life —and buoy human health. But, in the coming months, as we start meeting and greeting many of our friends and relatives, the situation will improve.

Going forward, don't panic. All of us need to sharpen up on our own coping skills till life regains a semblance of normality. And continue to observe personal hygiene always.

Do clearly outline your vision goal (distance vision, near vision or both and do you have to have perfect night vision, etc.)

Most usually, a combination of your vision goals along with the surgeon's selection of the lens implant in your best interest can lead to a satisfactory outcome. Anything less than this and you may become a statistic.

Emotions usually run high because of the cost of the implants beyond insurance and hence expectations must be clear before surgery.

Poor lens implant choices can lead to haloes and star bursts that can challenge the splendor of many a Deepavali lights.

By the same token, proper selection of the lens implant and surgical technique is one of the most gratifying surgical outcomes in modern medicine with a vision outcome that lasts a lifetime with well-earned bragging rights enough to divert the attention from Solitaires and Rolexes to the proud shimmer of your eyes.

EB-2 UPGRADES FOR INDIA-BORN PENDING EB-3 DOWNGRADES – PART I

The November 2021 Visa Bulletin shows that for India, the EB-3 Preference visa availability dates have moved back ("retrogressed") from Jan. 1, 2014 to Jan. 15, 2012. One year ago, many India born employment-based green card applicants with EB-2 priority dates between May 15, 2011 and Jan. 1, 2015 had worked frantically with their employers to file applications with U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) to "Downgrade" their EB-2 approved petitions to EB-3 in order to be eligible to file their applications for Adjustment of Status (AOS) while the window to file such applications remained open. Now, those applicants are questioning whether they can "Upgrade" back to EB-2.

The background is that historically, an applicant became eligible for a green card faster under the higher EB-2 preference category (for jobs requiring a master's degree or bachelor's degree and five years of experience) compared to the EB-3 preference category (for jobs that required less education or experience). However, during October 2020, EB-3 applicants with priority dates earlier than Jan. 1, 2015 were allowed to apply for Adjustment of Status, while EB-2 applicants required priority dates earlier than May 15, 2011. This was because USCIS allowed AOS applicants to use the "Filing Dates" listed in the October 2020 Visa Bulletin instead of "Final Action" dates.

Note that even after USCIS has completed its processing of the AOS application and is ready to approve the application, the green card cannot be issued unless visas are available as shown in the Final Action date of the Visa Bulletin at that time. For October 2020, the Final Action dates for India were Sept. 1, 2009 for EB-2 and Jan. 15, 2010 for EB-3. During the

past year until October 2021, India Final Action dates for EB-2 continued to move forward from Sept. 1, 2009 to Sept. 1, 2011. The EB-3 Final Action dates also moved forward to Jan. 1, 2014.

However, the November 2021 Visa Bulletin shows that while the Final Action Date for India EB-2 moved forward to Dec. 1, 2011, the EB-3 date retrogressed to Jan. 15, 2012. The prediction is that the EB-3 India date will continue to retrogress.

So, if you have an EB-2 approved Petition and filed a "Downgrade" to EB-3 with an AOS application which is still in process at USCIS, can you switch it back or Upgrade to EB-2, and if so how?

For now, an upgrade is advantageous if your EB-2 priority date is earlier than Dec. 1, 2011. In the coming months, it may be relevant to more applicants if the EB-2 date advances further. Predictions on how the dates will progress is a topic for another article, but there is a lot of discussion among immigration attorneys about options to utilize the EB-2 priority date. Some are suggesting that you file a new AOS application with full documentation and filing fees. Others are suggesting that you "interfile" a request to USCIS to use the EB-2 petition.

If you file a new application, USCIS will certainly accept the application. The downside is that you have to pay the filing fees all over again. Also, the new AOS application will be processed as of the date received by USCIS. You would lose any benefit from the fact that the existing application has been in process for almost a year.

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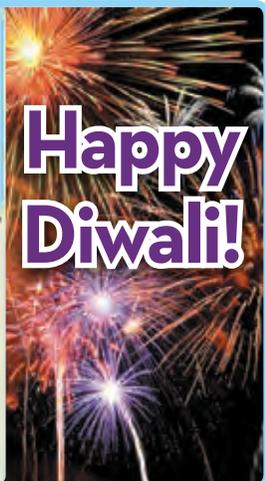
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OVERHAULED LEXUS IS350 IS MORE ALLURING THAN EVER!

This is one of our favorite compact sport sedans. Why? It is just a real fun car to drive, ready to take off in an instant, nimble in traffic and swift to merge on busy highways. In figures: 0 to 60 in barely 5.6 seconds, ¼-mile in 13.8 seconds and top speed of 143 mph. What makes the IS350 even better for 2021 are the numerous changes Lexus has made inside out though the power train stays as is. Length and width are up by 1.8 inches though height is unchanged.

Under the unitized steel body still resides a 3.5-liter V-6 engine that cranks out 311 horsepower @ 6600 rpm and 280 pounds-feet of torque @ 4800 rpm. Equipped with the IS F high-performance model's eight-speed auto gearbox, it can be driven in eco, normal, sport or snow modes. Though our test was a rear-wheel drive, you can opt for an electronically controlled all-weather drive for firmer grip and traction. Suspension is handled by an independent double wishbone front and a multilink rear system to smoothen breaks, bumps and turns on the road. The rack-and-pinion steering with electric power assist is quick, precise and well-weighted.

Slimmer LED headlights and daytime running lights flank the massive and redesigned spindle grille, a color-coordinated front functional air intake with full-width tail lamps and dual chrome tips in the rear. Now that all IS350s will have standard F Sport features, the front and rear bumpers receive a distinctive look as does

the grille surround and rocker moldings. Niceties include dual auto a/c, 60/40 rear seat, 10-way power and eight-way front-passenger heated/cooled seats, moon roof, LFA-inspired 8-inch TFT instrument cluster with sliding bezel, silver-metallic analog clock, and a power tilt/telescopic steering column. A mouse-like, easy-to-use Remote Touch enables the driver to toggle navigation, climate, audio and phone controls, which are displayed on a 10.3-inch screen.

Dual front and side airbags, side curtain airbag, front knee airbags, vehicle stability and traction controls, front/rear crumple zones, four-

wheel antilock brakes with electronic brake distribution and brake assist, blind spot monitor with rear cross traffic alert, daytime running lights and a tire pressure monitoring system are standard. Add in a pre-collision system that detects pedestrians, lane departure assist and dynamic cruise control, all part of the no-cost Lexus Safety Sense+.

Looking for a little bit of gusto in your ride? Then the rev-happy and powerful IS350 will be more than delighted to oblige. A lavish cabin and respectable fuel economy should help seal the deal.

FAIRLY NEW VW ATLAS IS A HUGE HIT!

Introduced in 2018, the fairly new Atlas is the largest VW on the road today, eclipsing its younger sibling the Tiguan. Under the hood sits a sole 3.6-liter V-6 engine putting out 276 horsepower @ 6200 rpm and 266 pounds-feet of torque @ 2750 rpm. For a vehicle weighing nearly 4,700 pounds, it's quick off the mark, responding with agility in any situation. The midsize SUV offers an 8-speed auto gearbox. Ensclosed on the unitary body is a robust independent four-wheel suspension. Tow capacity is a remarkable 5,000 pounds.



Available as a front-wheel or all-wheel drive (our trim), this replacement for the Touareg appears to be attracting lots of attention, all good. Horizontal LED headlights and daytime running lights flank chrome bars with a centered VW insignia. The attractive cabin of the SUV epitomizes European styling and flair with a simple but elegant instrument panel of large analog speedometer and tachometer gauges and a centered driver information

center. The 60/40 second-row seat tilts and slides 7.7 inches forward effortlessly while the 50/50 third row is big enough for two adults to sit comfortably. Passenger volume is commendable at 153.7 cubic feet while you get an astonishing 96.8 cubic feet behind the front row with all rear seats down. Like the sun to come down on you? Open up the 4.4-by-2.8-foot panoramic sunroof. Amenities include an 8-inch touch screen for

audio, nav and phone controls, tri-zone auto a/c with second-row air vents, three-spoke leather steering column, front heated/cooled seats, and a power lift gate.

Dual front and side airbags, side curtain airbag for both rows, four-wheel antilock brakes with brake assist, electronic stability with anti-slip regulation and engine brake assist, traction control, lane departure and forward collision warning, blind-spot monitor, front/rear park distance control, hill start assist

and descent control, adaptive cruise control, overhead and rearview camera, tire pressure monitoring system and daytime running lights are standard.

Competition is fierce in the midsize SUV segment but this fairly new ride has been receiving rave reviews from its owners. Apart from a potent power train and good looks, a roomy third-row seat and generous cargo hold should ensure that the VW Atlas becomes a frontrunner.

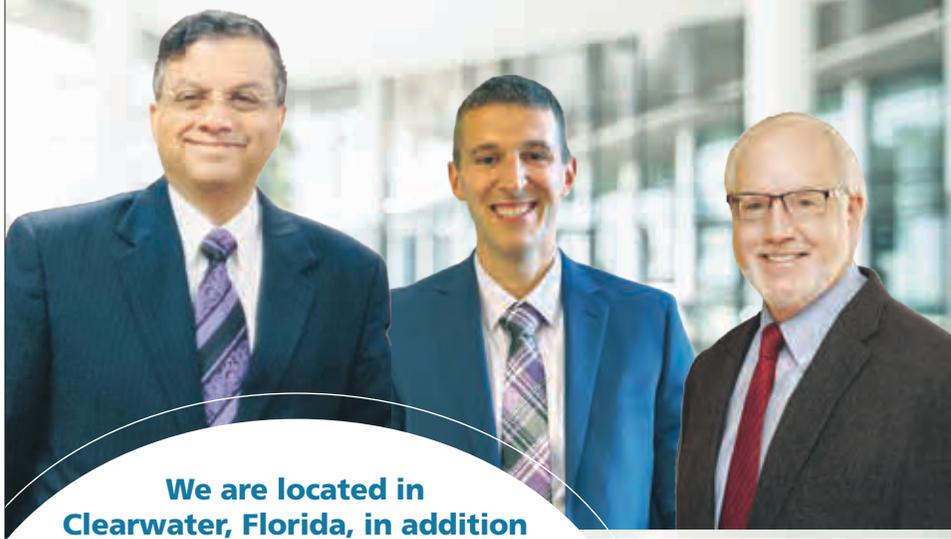

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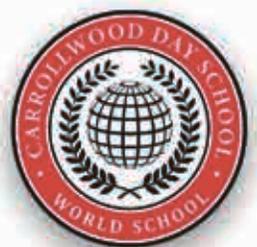
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
